ANYORK LEE MOTIONS TO APPROVE THE FEBRUARY 24, 2011 MEETING MINUTES. PAUL WEISMAN SECONDS. 6 – 0 – 0. MOTION PASSES.

# 7. Chair's Report

Chair Brewer shared that the Department has asked the Acupuncture Board to initiate another 5% cut in operating costs. The Department has asked that the Board focus on it's Enforcement cases. This has taken more of the Board's time especially since the Board has been operating at 66% staff occupancy.

Chair Brewer noted that the Blue Ribbon Panel has not met as they must meet the same requirements as Board Meetings but with the current budgetary requirements prevent the Board from moving forward. The Department has informed the office that they are looking for ways for the Board to conduct these meeting as well as to hire additional staff in light of the hiring freeze.

Chair Brewer thanked LaVonne Powell for her service with not only the Board but with the Department. She has retired from state service and she will be missed.

#### 8. Executive Officer's Report

Janelle Wedge gave the Executive Officer's Report to the Board.

#### 9. Sunset Review

Executive Officer, Janelle Wedge, asked the Board how they would like to approach the completion of the Sunset Review. Spencer Walker stated that other Boards have formed committees. Janelle Wedge noted that the report is due November 1<sup>st</sup>. Robert Brewer and Nancy Carroll volunteered to be a part of the Committee. Hugh Morrison asked if the Sunset Review will be available for public Review. Legal Counsel Spencer Walker responded that it will be viewable after it has been submitted.

#### a. Enforcement Case Report

Kristine Brothers gave the Board the Enforcement Case Report.

#### **11. Education Business**

#### a. Golden State University

Education Coordinator Benjamin Bodea presented the material requested by the Board at the previous meeting of Golden State University. Robert Brewer asked Benjamin if the numbers are within the Board's requirements. Benjamin replied that they have met the Board's requirements and are ready eligible to be voted on by the Board for approval. AnYork Lee noted that the school looks good now but that as schools grow they loose their ability to have quality education. Robert Brewer remarked that Golden State University has met all the requirements for approval and that their viability years from now is not the question. He continued noting that although this is a challenge of schools as they grow, it is a separate issue that should be addressed at a different time.

## 12. Examination Business

## a. August 16, 2011 Examination

Janelle Wedge read to the Board the report on the recent Examination. The passing score workshop is being carried out on this day and results will be in shortly.

## b. Educators as Subject Matter Experts

Janelle Wedge mentioned that several members of the public have requested that this topic be placed on the Agenda. To clarify the position of the Board on this issue Janelle Wedge noted the Department's policy on not allowing Educators as Subject Matter Experts. As such, the Acupuncture Board will adhere with the same policy.

# c. Discussion on Continuing Multi-Language Exam

Spencer Walker addressed the Board with the State's position and thus the Board's is that as officials of the State of California the Board shall take all steps necessary to insure that the role of English as the Common language of California shall be preserved and enhanced. He also noted a report addressing bilingual proficiencies among CA health care professionals prepared for by the Center of Health Professions at the University of California, San Francisco. He noted that on Page seven of the report, that most US healthcare workers are trained and or tested in English with one exception, all healthcare professionals licensed in California are required to take their licensing test in English. The one exception is Acupuncture. Spencer Walker was alarmed at that fact and raised the question of why the Acupuncture Board's Licensing Exam is not inline with the California constitution. Spencer Walker wants to begin discussion to repeal California Code Regulations section 1399.441, the section that authorizes the Board to offer the exam in other languages. Once that is done, all California Boards will be offering their licensing their exams in English. The regulatory process will take one year. If the Board would like to offer more time the Board can add a subsection affording the schools more time by specifying a date of adoption. Robert Brewer added that he would like to also see a time limit and an English proficiency requirement for all current licensees. Spencer Walker noted that the proficiency requirement for already licensed practitioners could be added through CE. Bill Mosca, of CSOMA, urges the Board to separate the multi-lingual exam issue from the continuing education issue. Jacques MoraMarco of Emperor's College agreed with Bill Mosca. Sunny Kim of Golden State University stated that Korean or Chinese language should be allowed for the tests as those languages are the cultures in which this medicine developed but the Board should require an English proficiency exam. Several members of the public voiced that removal of the multi-language exam will severely limit the student pool, thus reducing school income. The number of practitioners schooled overseas that are now teaching in these languages at California schools would severely drop thus limiting the knowledge pool in this state. Robert Brewer addressed the public that this is being brought up to start the process and discussion will ensue once the Board has motioned for its approval.

# 13. Future Agenda Items

Chair Brewer would like to see staff come back with language for English Proficiency as a CE requirement. Member Weisman asked to have Ethics as a CE requirement on the next agenda as well as ethics class required for licensees that have been disciplined. Member Lee would like the Board to re-evaluate the Criteria for School Approval. Member Kim would like the Board to re-evaluate the criteria for schools keeping their approval, including clinical tests. Bill Mosca would like to see SB 628 on Traumatology discussed at the next meeting. Jacques MoraMarco would like the Board to address no longer publishing the Booklist as well as the process of how books are selected.

# 14, Public Comments

AKAMAK introduced themselves as well as their new president to the Board. The organization urged the Board to consider switching to a laminated or plastic license as the paper one falls apart to easily. Ron Zaidman of Five Branches University asked about the publishing of the February Exam Statistics. Janelle Wedge noted that due to the challenge with the Korean Exam in February Board & OPES Staff looking at how to present the information without being misleading. Jacques MoraMarco stated that the statistics for the other languages should be able to be released. Hugh Morrison of NGAOM asked for the Board to define the term Curriculum as used in section 1399.434 & 1399.439 as it applies to the Acupuncture Board approving programs. Several candidates from of the Korean Exam in February gave the Board a packet of information regarding the exam along with unanswered questions from that exam.

#### • Board Updates

The Board recently lost two board members, Nancy Carroll and Frank He, in that their appointments were not sent for Senate confirmation. It is my understanding that the Governor's Office is actively working to fill those two vacancies.

The Board will be relocating to our new office on Monday, November 21st. Staff has been extremely busy cleaning out and packing. This has all been in addition to attempting to stay current with daily activities and filling in on the vacant desks.

The Board continues to have three vacancies. The Department's Operational Efficiency Plan (otherwise known as the reduction plan) has been approved by the Department of Finance (DOF). This approval still requires Boards to submit Hiring Freeze Exemption Requests to fill only our most critical positions. However, final approval of Hiring Freeze Exemption Request rests with the Agency Secretary, so the approval process will be shortened. Hopefully the process will be shortened as our most recent exemption request has been with the DCA since August 10, 2011

### DCA Update

On 9/13/11 and 10/11/11, DCA Director Brian Stiger conducted monthly telephone conference calls with all of the Board Presidents/Chairs to provide an update of DCA activities. Chair Robert Brewer and/or the Executive Officer Janelle Wedge has participated in these monthly conference calls. Discussion topics focused on the state hiring freeze, board member appointments, budget change proposals, Breeze, legislation and expert consultant contract requirements.

# Budget Update

DCA is submitting a departmental BCP for Budget Year 2012/13 to obtain the required funds to implement Breeze and the credit card processing of payments. The Board is tentatively scheduled to implement Breeze in March 2013.

The Board has received approval for two out of state trips this fiscal year. Both trips are identified for on-site reviews of two new schools, one in Arizona and the other in New York.

#### • Sunset Review

The Board filed our Sunset Review Report with the Senate Committee on Business, Professions and Economic Development on November 1, 2011. A hearing date has not been scheduled, however, It is anticipated that it will be in early 2012.

SENATE BILL

No. 628

#### **Introduced by Senator Yee**

February 18, 2011

An act to amend Sections 4935, 4955, 4955.1, 4955.2, 4956, 4960.2, 4961, 4965, 4966, 4967, and 4969 of, to add Section Sections 4936 and 4964.5 to, and to add Article 3 (commencing with Section 4950) to Chapter 12 of Division 2 of, the Business and Professions Code, relating to acupuncture.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 628, as amended, Yee. Acupuncture: regulation.

Existing law, the Acupuncture Licensure Act, establishes the Acupuncture Board and makes it responsible for enforcing and administering the act, including licensing persons who meet specified licensure requirements. Under the act, licensees are titled "acupuncturists," and are authorized to perform designated activities pursuant to their license. The unlawful practice of acupuncture *and any other violation of the act* is a crime.

This bill would, commencing May 1, 2012, require the board to issue a certificate to practice as a traditional Chinese Medicine traumatologist to an applicant who meets certain training and clinical experience requirements and pays a specified fee. The bill would limit the submittal

of applications to the period between January 1, 2012, and December 15, 2012, and would prohibit the board from issuing a certificate after December 15, 2012. The bill would require the board to establish the Traumatology Committee within the board with specified duties, including determination of certification standards and evaluation of whether an applicant meets those standards. The bill would set forth procedures for the renewal of an unexpired or expired certificate to perform traditional Chinese Medicine traumatology and would establish specified fees in that regard. The bill would make it a crime to use the title of "certification requirements and to fraudulently buy or sell a certificate for traditional Chinese Medicine traumatology, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program.

The bill would authorize a person with a current and valid license to practice acupuncture to use the title of Doctor of Acupuncture only if he or she has met certain educational requirements, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: yes.

#### The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 4935 of the Business and Professions 2 Code is amended to read:

4935. (a) (1) It is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not 3 less than one hundred dollars (\$100) and not more than two 4 thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), or by imprisonment in a 5 county jail not exceeding one year, or by both that fine and 6 imprisonment, for any person who does not hold a current and 7 valid license to practice acupuncture under this chapter to hold 8 himself or herself out as practicing or engaging in the practice of 9 acupuncture, or to hold himself or herself out as a certified 10 traditional Chinese Medicine traumatologist or use the title of 11 "certified traditional Chinese Medicine traumatologist" without 12 meeting the requirements of this chapter. 13

1 (2) It is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than 2 one hundred dollars (\$100) and not more than two thousand five 3 hundred dollars (\$2,500), or by imprisonment in a county jail not 4 exceeding one year, or by both that fine and imprisonment, for 5 any person to fraudulently buy, sell, or obtain a license to practice 6 acupuncture or a certificate for traditional Chinese Medicine 7 traumatology, or to violate the provisions of this chapter.

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(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any person, 8 other than a physician and surgeon, a dentist, or a podiatrist, who 9 is not licensed under this article but is licensed under Division 2 10 (commencing with Section 500), who practices acupuncture 11 involving the application of a needle to the human body, performs 12 any acupuncture technique or method involving the application of 13 a needle to the human body, or directs, manages, or supervises 14 another person in performing acupuncture involving the application 15 of a needle to the human body is guilty of a misdemeanor. 16

(c) A person holds himself or herself out as engaging in the 17 practice of acupuncture by the use of any title or description of 18 services incorporating the words "acupuncture," "acupuncturist," 19 "certified acupuncturist," "licensed acupuncturist," "Asian 20 medicine," "oriental medicine," "Traditional Chinese Medicine," 21 or any combination of those words, phrases, or abbreviations of 22 those words or phrases, by representing that he or she is trained, 23 experienced, or an expert in the field of acupuncture, Asian 24 medicine, or Chinese medicine, or by representing that he or she 25 is trained, experienced, or an expert in the field of traditional 26 Chinese Medicine traumatology. 27

28 (d) Subdivision (a) shall not prohibit a person from 29 administering acupuncture treatment as part of his or her 30 educational training if he or she:

31 (1) Is engaged in a course or tutorial program in acupuncture,
32 as provided in this chapter; or

(2) Is a graduate of a school of acupuncture approved by the
board and participating in a postgraduate review course that does
not exceed one year in duration at a school approved by the board. *SEC. 2. Section 4936 is added to the Business and Professions*

(j) The violation of any law or local ordinance on an 20 acupuncturist's or certified traditional Chinese Medicine 21 traumatologist's business premises by an acupuncturist's or 22 certified traditional Chinese Medicine traumatologist's employee 23 or a person who is working under the acupuncturist's or certified 24 traditional Chinese Medicine traumatologist's professional license 25 or business permit, that is substantially related to the qualifications, 26 functions, or duties of an acupuncturist or certified traditional 27 Chinese Medicine traumatologist. These violations shall subject 28 the acupuncturist or certified traditional Chinese Medicine 29 traumatologist who employed the individuals, or under whose 30 acupuncture license or traumatology certificate the employee is 31 working, to disciplinary action. 32

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# OPPOSE SB 628 (YEE)

SB 628 - Chinese Traumatology Author: Senator Leland Yee (District 8 – San Francisco, San Mateo County)

# SB 628 is dangerous for California

SB 628 would require the California Acupuncture Board (CAB) to issue certificates to practice as "Chinese traumatologists." By requiring certification of potentially substandard health care providers, the bill poses a significant danger to California consumers.

Proponents of SB 628 have argued that this bill is a "title bill" that simply establishes a professional title without addressing details such as standards and scope of practice. However, the bill goes far beyond establishing a professional title. It abdicates the California State Legislature's authority to define and control standards and scope by endowing a subcommittee of the California Acupuncture Board with *carte blanche* authority to make these critical decisions.

**Fails to establish sustained, long-term health care option for California consumers.** Benefits of SB 628 are transient and primarily accrue to those who would apply for certification. Given that the brief and transient period during which individuals may apply for certification as a Chinese traumatologist (Jan 1, 2012 - Dec 15, 2012), the bill appears to be focused upon satisfying the needs of a special interest group that is unable or unwilling to obtain licensing or certification through existing means.

**No educational or certification standards.** However, the bill presupposes that such standards can be appropriately established. Given the complete absence of educational and certification standards for Chinese traumatology as a stand-alone field in the United States, it is not yet know if a sufficiently safe and protective certification standard can be set.

**No certification examination—written or practical.** No other health care field licensed or certified by the State of California is exempt from an examination to objectively measure essential knowledge, skills, and abilities required of entry-level practitioners. The absence of a certification examination poses a significant danger to consumer health and safety.

**No defined scope of practice.** This bill gives a subcommittee of the Acupuncture Board a blank check with respect to the scope of practice for traumatologists. The ultimate scope of traumatologist certificate holders will be left to this subcommittee and could be broader than those of acupuncturists, physical therapists, or chiropractors, but Chinese traumatology as a stand-alone field lacks the educational standards, programmatic accreditation, and rigorous examinations that undergird the respective scopes of practice for these well-established professions.

**No continuing education.** Traumatologists would become the first professional health care provider regulated by the State of California that is exempt from continuing

education as a condition of license or certification renewal. Continuing education is the accepted mechanism used by regulators to encourage health care practitioners to expand their knowledge base and abreast new developments in the field.

**No jurisdiction over clinical supervisors.** Licensed physicians and surgeons would directly supervise traumatologists in clinical practice. However, the California Acupuncture Board has no jurisdictional authority over physicians and surgeons and does not count any physicians or surgeons among its members.

**May harm licensed acupuncturists.** SB 628 proponents have stated that this bill will have no impact on the existing licensed acupuncture profession. However, unethical or negligent practice by Chinese traumatologists may harm the reputation of existing California Acupuncture Board licentiates if the California consumer is unable to distinguish between two fields under the jurisdiction of the same regulatory board. This is of particular concern given the utter absence of any established standards and practices in the field.

**Certification fees won't cover expenses.** According to estimates provided by the bill's author and, revenue received pursuant to Chinese traumatologist certification may not be sufficient to cover expenses. The existing Acupuncture Fund reserves, funded by fees from licensed acupuncturists, would be used to cover this revenue shortfall. Licensed acupuncturists will be forced to underwrite the fiscal impacts of this certification.

#### 1399.441. Languages.

# §1399.480. Definitions.

# For the purposes of section 901 of the code:

(a) "Community-based organization" means a public or private nonprofit organization that is representative of a community or a significant segment of a community, and is engaged in meeting human, educational, environmental, or public safety community needs.

(b) "Out-of-state practitioner" means a person who is not licensed in California to engage in the practice of acupuncture but who holds a current valid license or certificate in good standing in another state, district, or territory of the United States to practice acupuncture.

NOTE: Authority cited: Sections 901 and 4933, Business and Professions Code. Reference: Section 901, Business and Professions Code.

# §1400.1. Sponsoring Entity Registration and Recordkeeping Requirements.

(a) Registration. A sponsoring entity that wishes to provide, or arrange for the provision of, health care services at a sponsored event under section 901 of the code shall register with the board not later than 90 calendar days prior to the date on which the sponsored event is scheduled to begin. A sponsoring entity shall register with the board by submitting to the board a completed Form 901-A (01/2011), which is hereby incorporated by reference.

(b) Determination of Completeness of Form. The board may, by resolution, delegate to the Department of Consumer Affairs the authority to receive and process Form 901-A on behalf of the board. The board or its delegatee shall inform the sponsoring entity within 15 calendar days of receipt of Form 901-A in writing that the form is either complete and the sponsoring entity is registered or that the form is deficient and what specific information or documentation is required to complete the form and be registered. The board or its delegatee shall reject the registration if all of the identified deficiencies have not been corrected at least 30 days prior to the commencement of the sponsored event.

(c) Recordkeeping Requirements. Regardless of where it is located, a sponsoring entity shall maintain at a physical location in California a copy of all records required by section 901 as well as a copy of the authorization for participation issued by the board to an out-of-state practitioner. The sponsoring entity shall maintain these records for a period of at least five years after the date on which a sponsored event ended. The records may be maintained in either paper or electronic form. The sponsoring entity shall notify the board at the time of registration as to the form in which it will maintain the records. In addition, the sponsoring entity shall keep a copy of all records required by section 901(g) of the code at the physical location of the sponsored event until that event has ended. These records shall be available for inspection and copying during the operating hours of the sponsored event upon request of any representative of the board.

(d) Requirement for Prior Board Approval of Out-of-State Practitioner. A sponsoring entity shall not permit an out-of-state practitioner to participate in a sponsored event unless and until the sponsoring entity has received written approval from the board.

(e) Report. Within 15 calendar days after a sponsored event has concluded, the sponsoring entity shall file a report with the board summarizing the details of the sponsored event. This report may be in a form of the sponsoring entity's choosing, but shall include, at a minimum, the following information:

(1) The date(s) of the sponsored event;

(2) The location(s) of the sponsored event;

(3) The type(s) and general description of all health care services provided at the sponsored event; and

(4) A list of each out-of-state practitioner granted authorization pursuant to this article who participated in the sponsored event, along with the license number of that practitioner.

# §1400.2. Out-of-State Practitioner Authorization to Participate in Sponsored Event

(a) Request for Authorization to Participate. An out-of-state practitioner ("applicant") may request authorization from the board to participate in a sponsored event and provide such health care services at the sponsored event as would be permitted if the applicant were licensed by the board to provide those services. An applicant shall request authorization by submitting to the board a completed Form 901-B (01/2011), which is hereby incorporated by reference, accompanied by a non-refundable processing fee of \$ applicant shall also furnish either a full set of fingerprints or submit a Live Scan inquiry to establish the identity of the applicant and to permit the board to conduct a criminal history record check.

(b) Response to Request for Authorization to Participate. Within 20 calendar days of receiving a completed request for authorization, the board shall notify the sponsoring entity whether that request is approved or denied.

(c) Denial of Request for Authorization to Participate.

(1) The board shall deny a request for authorization to participate if:

(A) The submitted Form 901-B is incomplete and the applicant has not responded within 7 calendar days to the board's request for additional information.

[(B) The applicant has not met the following educational and experience requirements:

(D) The applicant has failed to comply with a requirement of this article or has committed any act that would constitute grounds for denial of an application for licensure by the board.

(E) The applicant does not possess a current valid license in good standing. The term "good standing" means the applicant: (i) Has not been charged with an offense for any act substantially related to the practice for which the applicant is

licensed by any public agency; (ii) Has not entered into an

(ii) Has not entered into any consent agreement or been subject to an administrative decision that contains conditions placed upon the applicant's professional conduct or practice, including any voluntary surrender of license;

(iii) Has not been the subject of an adverse judgment resulting from the practice for which the applicant is licensed that the board determines constitutes evidence of a pattern or negligence or incompetence.

(2) The board may deny a request for authorization to participate if:

(A) The request is received less than 20 calendars days before the date on which the sponsored event will begin.

(B) The applicant has been previously denied a request for authorization by the board to participate in a sponsored event.

(C) The applicant has previously had an authorization to participate in a sponsored event terminated by the board.

(D) The applicant has participated in **Example 2** or more sponsored events during the 12 month period immediately preceding the current application.

(d) Appeal of Denial. An applicant requesting authorization to participate in a sponsored event may appeal the denial of such request by following the procedures set forth in section 4.

# §1400.3. Termination of Authorization and Appeal.

(a) Grounds for Termination. The Board may terminate an out-of-state practitioner's authorization to participate in a sponsored event for any of the following reasons:

(1) The out-of-state practitioner has failed to comply with any applicable provision of this article, or any applicable practice requirement or regulation of the board.

(2) The out-of-state practitioner has committed an act that would constitute grounds for discipline if done by a licensee of the board.

(3) The board has received a credible complaint indicating that the out-ofstate practitioner is unfit to practice at the sponsored event or has otherwise endangered consumers of the practitioner's services.

(b) Notice of Termination. The board shall provide both the sponsoring entity and the out-of-state practitioner with a written notice of the termination.

including the basis for the termination. If the written notice is provided during a sponsored event, the board may provide the notice to any representative of the sponsored event on the premises of the event.

(c) Consequences of Termination. An out-of-state practitioner shall immediately cease his or her participation in a sponsored event upon receipt of the written notice of termination.

<u>Termination of authority to participate in a sponsored event shall be</u> deemed a disciplinary measure reportable to the national practitioner data banks. In addition, the board shall provide a copy of the written notice of termination to the licensing authority of each jurisdiction in which the out-of-state practitioner is licensed.

(d) Appeal of Termination. An out-of-state practitioner may appeal the board's decision to terminate an authorization in the manner provided by section 901(j)(2) of the code. The request for an appeal shall be considered a request for an informal hearing under the Administrative Procedure Act.

(e) Informal Conference Option. In addition to requesting a hearing, the out-of-state practitioner may request an informal conference with the executive officer regarding the reasons for the termination of authorization to participate. The executive officer shall, within 30 days from receipt of the request, hold an informal conference with the out-of-state practitioner. At the conclusion of the informal conference, the executive officer may affirm or dismiss the termination of authorization to participate. The executive officer shall state in writing the reasons for his or her action and mail a copy of his or her findings and decision to the out-of-state practitioner does not waive his or her request for a hearing to contest a termination of authorization by requesting an informal conference, the termination is dismissed after the informal conference, the request for a hearing shall be deemed to be withdrawn.





My name is Patty Alessi and I am a licensed acupuncturist in the state of California. I am writing to you because I would like to bring two things to your attention in hopes that some changes can be made in the requirements for continuing education for California acupuncturists. Number one is that I would like to see the requirements for the number of CEU's for acupuncturists be returned to the previous level of 30 CEU's every two years. Requiring 50 CEU's for acupuncturists puts a large burden on us. One of the most concerning aspects of this is the substantial financial cost associated with it. I live in a small, rural, Northern California town, which is more than two hours away from San Francisco where most of the CEU classes are held. Those who live in San Francisco can just drop in for the day and receive their units. I must drive for more than two hours, book a hotel and eat several meals in restaurants. Number two is that I believe all of the CEU's should be able to be done online. This would eliminate the travel requirements associated with CEU's and would significantly reduce the course costs. Many other medical professionals are now able to fulfill CEU requirements through online classes and I would ask that you consider providing the same privilege to Acupuncturists.

In fact, I had to receive a copy of my CALE examination result by fax since I was back in Korea. I had to utilize relatives' addresses to receive all mails. If I remember correctly, I believe I utilized my wife's uncle's address to receive my original license. I tried to contact California Acupuncture Board several times by telephone back then, but I was not able to communicate with the office that time. Regardless of the situations I was in, I understand that it is my responsibility to keep everything updated, but please consider the situation I was in that time.
- Once again, it was my fault for not having enough understanding about the regulations. I did not realize that I had 3 years before my original license was cancelled. My understanding back then was that my license becomes cancelled if I can't renew before the expiration date. I believe that it was in 1999 when my license was expired.

My name is Gou Chen Cheng and I am currently practicing Acupuncture and Chinese Herbology in the state of Michoacan, Mexico. Prior to this I had been continually licensed by the state of California between the years of 1976 and 2008. I have recently discovered that my license status is listed as cancelled and I am in emergent need to return to CA. I write to you under extenuating circumstances with a request that I be granted permission to return my license to active status by completing continuing education in lieu of retaking the Board Exam. It was not my intention to allow my license to lapse, however, due to poor mail delivery services here, and the fact that I am not familiar with the use of the internet services, I regrettably did not maintain my CA license.

Most recently, my wife and I were abducted by force after leaving our office. We were violently overcome, forced into our car and taken to our home where our personal belongings were ransacked and stolen. Although we were spared our lives, we have been under continual threat by these men who continue demanding money. Unfortunately, this is happening more frequently and those who have gone to the authorities have not received much help. Some have fared worse for their pleas of help. I fear for the safety of my family and must flee our home here in Mexico. I would depart immediately, but I cannot leave my wife and her two young children here alone. Because of my emergent need to return I've only just discovered the status of my license. I have initiated the necessary paperwork to seek asylum for my family through the US Dept. of Justice, but I am concerned that I will not be able to continue my practice and livelihood upon return to California.

While I have not accrued any CEUs or PDAs while in Mexico, 2004 to present, I did maintain a very busy practice six days a week with a patient load of approximately 25 to 30 patients a day.

More recently, the patient numbers are about 8 to 10 per day. I have renewed my Mexican license annually. Prior to moving to Mexico, I maintained two separate offices in Covina and Costa Mesa, California. I have never had any complaints filed in either California or Mexico and I have always maintained busy, productive practices. It is my hope that the Board will take these extenuating circumstances into account and grant my request for reinstatement of my license by means of continuing education.

I understand that the Board will meet next on May 18, 2011 and I would like to request that my petition be included on the agenda for that meeting.

While I worked I could get the chance to change my visa status, the permanent resident status with the help of the company. I would like to issue a formal apology to the California Acupuncture Board for my refusal to comply with your regulatory requirements for licensure renewal. Your board may recall that in 1997, I refrained from including my SSN# on my application for renewal as a means of peacefully protesting what I believed to be the inappropriate use of an SSN#.

As a humble servant of the acupuncture community in California for 20 years, I am ready to begin serving the community once again - both as an educator and a practitioner.

I have included the following excerpt from my recent letter to Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, requesting a formal pardon and the reinstatement of my license either in full or for educational purposes only as consideration for the extenuating circumstances inside of which my license lapsed for non-compliance:

## **"LICENSURE REINSTATEMENT PROPOSAL**

- 1. I will provide the Board with a formal apology letter acknowledging the importance of complying with the Board's SSN policy. (See attached fully executed letter)
- 2. I will complete an apprenticeship program with an acupuncturist qualified by the Board.

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- 3. I will provide the Board with a payment to cover all required License Renewal Fees.

Dear Governor Schwarzenegger:

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to petition you to consider issuing a pardon to reinstate my acupuncture license. I received my license in 1983 upon graduating from SAMRA University in Los Angeles. I served the Los Angeles acupuncture community from 1983 to 1996 without any formal complaints or disciplinary incidences. (see attached complete C.V./Bio)

In the early 1990s, I was given poor legal advice to withhold my SSN number from inclusion on my annual renewal application with the California Acupuncture Board. My SSN number was well known to the State of California, since I first obtained the number as child actor at the age of 10. However, despite these facts, I was denied license renewal in 1997.

I subsequently went into early retirement to pursue research at the University of Illinois at Chicago and allowed my legal advisors to contest the California Acupuncture Committee's conclusion regarding licensure renewal. I never attended any of the subsequent court sessions. I had simply forgotten about it until <u>I was informed in 1999</u> that my license was not going to be renewed in California. because too much time had elapsed while the case was pending in the courts.

The legal case and therefore reinstatement was denied due to a little known statute that states that an SSN number is required to track child support payments. This denial has damaged my ability to support my family. I am the proud father of four. My family convened the first California State Constitution and founded the Santa Barbara Mission. In addition, I was one of the founding members of the California Acupuncture Association.

I am requesting a formal pardon so that I may once again contribute to the Acupuncture Community. I would like to request a pardon based on the special circumstances of my lapse in licensure, to excuse my absence under special circumstances, and give me the opportunity to reinstate my license under the following proposal:

## LICENSURE REINSTATEMENT PROPOSAL

- 1. I will provide the Board with a formal apology letter acknowledging the importance of complying with the Board's SSN policy. (See attached fully executed letter)
- 2. I will complete an apprenticeship program with an acupuncturist qualified by the Board.
- 3. I will provide the Board with a payment to cover all required License Renewal Fees.
- 4. I will continue to give free lectures on prevention of childhood obesity and hygiene throughout the Orange County school system.
- 5. I will continue to give public lectures and write papers on the philosophy of Chinese medicine and will make myself available to write editorials for the Board at their request.
