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25	12. On or about March 12, 2015, a male Los Angeles Police Department officer <sup>1</sup>	
26	participated in an investigation of <i>Gold Massage</i> and went to the establishment in an undercover	
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28		
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capacity, posing as a customer. The officer paid \$60.00 to receive a one-hour massage. The 1 2 officer was taken to a room wherein he disrobed and lay face down on the massage table, with a towel covering his buttocks. 3

13. Respondent entered the room, massaged his back and legs for approximately twenty 4 minutes and instructed him to turn over onto his back and massaged his chest and legs. 5

14. Respondent grabbed the officer's hand and squirted massage oil on his palm. Then 6 7 Respondent pointed to his groin area and shook her clinched fist, simulating manual stimulation 8 of the penis. The officer asked how much but Respondent did not respond with a price. 9 However, Respondent completely closed the massage room door and whispered, "You do it." 10 The officer twice asked how much it would be for Respondent to manually stimulate his penis and Respondent said, "Fifty is okay." 11

15. The officer stated, "Fifty for you to give me a hand job?" Respondent stated, "yes." 12 The officer asked for some water and when Respondent returned to the room he counted his 13 14 money in front of her and then gave Respondent \$50.00 which Respondent placed on top of a cabinet in the room. The officer then surreptitiously alerted other officers who entered Gold 15 Massage and arrested Respondent. 16

Respondent was later convicted of trespass in connection with the events of March 16. 17 12, 2015. However, she entered a diversion program and based on successful completion of 18 19 diversion, the criminal case was dismissed.

Respondent failed to report her March 12, 2015, arrest to the Board within 30 days of 17. 20 21 the arrest.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

22 (Unprofessional Conduct Of Licensee Who Engages In 23 Enumerated Penal Code Violations In The Work Premises) 24 Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 731, subdivision (a), of the 18. 25 Code in that she engaged in a violation of Penal Code section 647, subdivision (b), occurring in 26 the work area under her direct professional supervision or control. The circumstances are as 27 follows: 28

12	committed unprofessional conduct when she solicited or agreed to engage in an act of		
13	prostitution, conduct which would have warranted denial of licensure. The circumstances are as		
14	follows:

17	23. Respondent's acts and/or omissions set forth in paragraphs 13 through 15, inclusive,
